from the perspective of a hungarian scholar who has spent much time in the united states zoltàn szilassy seeks through the dramaturgical kaleidoscope of the american 1960s to locate what is permanent in some of the varied heritage of the period and to explore the whirlpool of innovations many of which are nondramatic in origin or character the book is divided into two parts the rebellious drama and the intermedia the three chapters in part 1 are edward albee first among equals varieties of the albee generation and the dramaturgical kaleidoscope of the sixties part 2 contains happenings and new performance theories the regional alternative theater and conclusion outlook and reminiscences surveying the american dramatic scene szilassy concludes the european observer may still hope that americans will keep or rather develop the kind of theatrical equilibrium that duly made the sixties unforgettable both at home and abroad

this is an authoritative and wide ranging history of american theatre in all its dimensions from theatre building to playwriting directors performers and designers engaging the theatre as a performance art a cultural institution and a fact of american social and political life the history addresses the economic context that conditioned the drama presented the history approaches its subject with a full awareness of relevant developments in literary criticism cultural analysis and performance theory at the same time it is designed to be an accessible challenging narrative all volumes include an extensive overview and timeline followed by chapters on specific aspects of theatre volume three examines the development of the theatre after world war ii through the productions of broadway and beyond and into regional theatre across the country contributors also analyze new directions in theatre design directing and acting as well as key plays and playwrights through the 1990s

as america passed from a mere venue for english plays into a country with its own nationally regarded playwrights william dunlap lived the life of a pioneer on the frontier of the fledgling american theatre full of adventures mishaps and close calls he adapted and translated plays for the american audience and wrote plays of his own as well learning how theatres and theatre companies operated from the inside out dunlap s masterpiece a history of american theatre was the first of its kind drawing on the author s own experiences in it he describes the development of theatre in new york philadelphia and south carolina as well as congress s first attempts at theatrical censorship never before previously indexed this edition also includes a new introduction by tice l miller

theater in america the impact of economic forces 1870 1967 jack poggi most observers agree that the american theater is ailing the author of this lively narrative diagnoses the ailment and argues that it is of longer duration and the causes are more

deep seated than most people realize mr poggi traces two closely related economic trends that have affected the quality of american drama centralization of production in new york city and the decline in theatrical activity since the 1920 s in his engrossing account of the traveling combination companies that replaced local stock companies of the conflict among businessmen for control of the theater in the late nineteenth century of the boom and decline on broadway in the 1920 s and of the subsequent repeated attempts to restore life to the theater the author shows that artistic vitality is linked to economic vitality he assesses the impact on the theater of motion pictures radio and television and of rising costs the stock market crash and subsidies from foundations his well reasoned conclusions often contradict commonly held assumptions in telling the story of the noncommercial groups that arose in reaction to the process of centralization in the broadway theater mr poggi emphasizes their struggle to retain independence and maintain high production standards while remaining economically solvent he presents for the first time a detailed history of the off broadway and off off broadway theater and describes the development decline and resurgence of the resident theater movement in considering the effect of economic changes on the art of the playwright mr poggi focuses on the playwright's freedom to write as he pleases and his ability to get his work produced pertinent anecdotes and carefully selected quotations from contemporary newspapers add interest to this tale of recurrent growth and decline with its colorful cast of businessmen philanthropists playwrights producers and actors from its telling emerge fresh insights and a new awareness of problems and possible solutions publisher

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
